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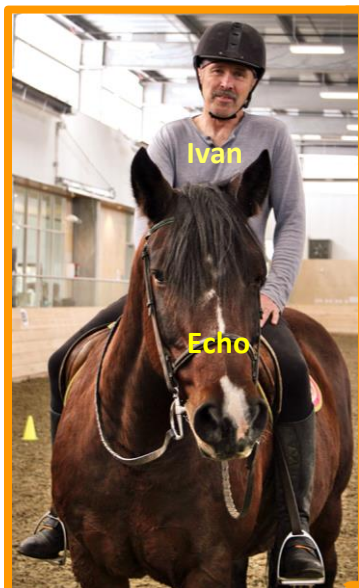

November 24th was National Driving Championship day at the Century Mile Racetrack and Casino. At 10:00 am, 8 drivers stopped by Little Bits Therapeutic Riding Association for a tour (given by Linda) and demonstration of our program (taught by Jo-Anne) at Whitemud Equine Learning Centre. Four riders from our program participated in a lesson, where 8 drivers learned a little about leading and side-walking. One brave driver even got a ride on Popeye. Big shoutout to Linda N., Debbie and Maddie who came out to help get horses ready and helped the drivers out, and for those at Century Mile Racetrack for reaching out to WELCA and LBTRA so that our program could be shown.



Fall 2022 Orientation

We had a tremendous turnout this fall with our orientation, as we paired up with Dr. Leanna Greenwich from the University of Alberta with her students in the Equine Science class. With everyone there, we had over 48 new volunteers, 10 fairly new volunteers that wanted to attend, and 5 returning volunteers who wanted to brush up on their skills. We had 8 returning volunteers who helped by leading horses, getting horses ready, bringing horses in to use during orientation time and returning them back to their fields and friends. Gwen also helped me by taking photos, which really does help when I must sign all of those legal documents.



The instructors extended the stations so that everyone could get a feel for leading and side-walking in particular. Lisa was one of the test riders and Sam was the other (huge applause for both doing a great job). Catherine showed everyone how to mount and lead with Gemini away from the mounting block (it's not as easy as some make it look). Cindi and Melody worked with Jaycie in one section on leading and side-walking, while Jo-Anne and Lynda worked with Maui in the other section on Leading and side-walking. This way they could have more students participate. Ros had plenty of help in the barn area with Jasper and Major showing what great horses they are by loving all the attention and being great, gentle horses with everyone.



Our returning volunteers helped make sure that everyone got swapped to the next station, kept areas clean and were ready to jump in to help if needed. Big thanks to Jenna, Gail, Michelle, Kale, Bev, Priya, and Gwen for helping and Andrea for speaking about our Board. Linda oversaw all and helped keep everything in order.

We are incredibly sad to say that one of our school horses, Mandy, passed away on July 27th. Mandy was a favourite school horse of adults and children alike and went in almost every program we have to offer, from summer camps to Little Bits to Horsemanship. She came to WELCA as a donation in 2011 and has been a diamond ever since. Many riders took their first canter strides on Mandy—either planned or unplanned! If a rider had a steady seat and hands, a sitting trot sometimes became an “oops canter” where she decided her riders were ready! Fast was her forte, but she was always willing to slow down and take care of her riders, too.

Ever playful, she was loved by riders for her versatility and great nature. These qualities were recognised in 2019, where Mandy was named the Alberta Equestrian Federation's Horse of the Year, an honor usually reserved for high-performance horses. Her crooked nose, bright eyes, and perfectly oval star were ready to greet anyone who came through her stall door. Fast or slow, she took care of them all, and she was always eager to meet her next partner.

Birdie was a beloved lesson horse who was equal parts sass and patience. Her colouring was very unique, and she turned heads wherever she went.

Birdie started out as a jump horse in a lesson program in Saskatoon. That is where her forever family found her - and they began to show her the world of gymkhana and roping. She came to WELCA just a few years ago and quickly became a barn favourite- introducing many people to the sport of horse riding.
